


Christ in the Desert by Ivan Kramskoi, 1872

As our community has entered into this new year, we currently find ourselves in the thick of Lent. The liturgical season is one of self denial, fasting, and almsgiving to prepare ourselves as a community for the Easter vigil. As the Pastoral Minister I have chosen to give up screen time, which has proved to be so much easier said than done. For those of us who choose to abstain, we have an endless sea of choices to pick from. Some of us will give up meals, others luxuries we rely upon just a tad too much, and some of us will wring our hands with too many choices to abstain from. The season is a reminder that we have been given days to feast and given days to fast, and the latter is at hand.

The biggest danger for our community is to believe the lie that we are not doing enough in this liturgical season. We often focus too much on our shortcomings. Our community will inevitably start to worry that we are not expressing love for each other enough. We will worry that we are not doing enough in our community, and that our little lifeboat will not be discovered by others. We worry that if we are not being busy we are not doing things right. If we believe the false promises of the accuser, we will throw ourselves from the top of the temple in the hope that others will notice and save us. But we must be like Jesus and refuse the temptation, to rely on the fact that we have been called here, to be a light and to attract others to our lifeboat. As a L'Arche community we are called not to be efficient, but to be a community of love, which in turn will be a light to our community.

<u>Contact your</u> <u>representative</u> Although President Trump has stated that he will not cut Social Security, Medicare, or Medicaid benefits, on February 25, 2025, House Republicans adopted a budget resolution that calls for the House Energy and Commerce Committee to cut \$880 billion in spending over the next ten years. If the Energy and Commerce Committee cut everything under its jurisdiction that's not healthcare related, the committee would still be short \$600 billion, according to the NY Times. This means cuts to Medicaid and Medicare are needed to reach the \$880 billion

reduction

L'Arche, like most organizations that care for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities, receives most of its funding from Medicaid.
Cuts could be devastating. In light of this potential crisis, L'Arche Syracuse is partnering with AccessCNY and ARC of Onondaga to remind government officials and the public why Medicaid and other government funding is needed to ensure the provision of essential supports and services for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities who live in Central New York.

Let your voice be heard and come out and support our Rally to support government funding and oppose cuts to Medicaid, Medicare and Social Security.
