A COLUMN FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Community life, just like an individual's life, has both an inward and outward journey. This issue of our Community newsletter reports on our inward journey (Day of Reflection, Board Appreciation Dinner) and outward journey (Holy Cross Visit, visit to the Bruderhof, community outings). Both aspects are vital to a balanced and healthy journey that expresses God's love. However, the more we are called to speak of God's love, the more we need to deepen the knowledge of that love in our own hearts. The farther the outward journey takes us, the deeper the inward journey must be. Only when our roots are deep (below ground) can our fruits be abundant (above ground).

We have to keep looking for people and places where our truth is spoken and where we are reminded of our deepest identity as the beloved. That is the truth we seek to speak in L'Arche by saying "thank you" to God for having chosen you, and "thank you" to all who remind you of your chosenness.

A DAY IN THE LIFE OF DAY HAB

Each morning that we have Day Hab, our Core Members start to arrive between 9:30 and 10:00am. Depending on the day we have numerous fun filled activities and adventures planned. We try to incorporate their daily goals into each day whether it is making healthy food choices, practicing reading and writing, safety, and socializing and interacting with their friends.

Tuesday's are our busiest Day hab day. In the mornings when the weather is nice we try and get out into the community to various parks, the local duck pond, the Gifford zoo, and many other fun adventures. The first Tuesday of each month the Day Hab program goes bowling where they often run into some of their peers from other groups. After the mornings' happenings, we say a prayer and enjoy lunch together as a group. Tuesday afternoons are spent being creative – painting flower pots, making birthday and anniversary cards for the L'Arche community. We make fun things with all the various avenues of art. From clay, to stickers, and lots of paints and markers; getting hands on and into projects is a lot of fun for all.

On Wednesday's we have a smaller group that experiences more one on one time with the assistants. We work on goals in the morning or go on outings into the community. The afternoons are spent doing various art projects or puzzles and

sometimes we even watch a movie and enjoy music. We hope to add a "service to others" program into the day to help them find places that can be mutually beneficial to both business and Core Member.

Friday's are Movie Club Days. Each week we have a rotating list of which Core Member gets to pick a movie. Sometimes they have a movie picked out for quite awhile and sometimes they like to surprise their friends' last minute with their choice. Before the movie starts we read

reviews and rating online and guess whether the movie will be better or worse than what the website rates it. After each movie we give it a final score and see how well the movie is liked.

Day Hab is a fun time while still incorporating working on goals. We get input from each Core Member on places they'd like to go and projects they'd like to work on. The goal is to grow our program to five days a week with more core members served.



L'ARCHE VENTURES TO THE BRUDERHOF

On the weekend of May 2 – 4, John, our Executive Director and Sam, our Pastoral Minister, visited the Woodcrest and Fox Hill Bruderhof communities in the Hudson Valley, New York. They went to thank them for sending ten assistants to L'Arche Syracuse over the past six years and to nurture our common bonds and mission. The Bruderhof is a Christian community in the Anabaptist tradition that was founded in Germany in 1920 by Eberhard Arnold. The Bruderhof seeks to live the Sermon on the Mount and early church practices of pacifism, peacemaking, a common purse, the proclamation of the gospel, and lifelong marriage. There are approximately 3,000 members living in 23 communities in seven countries.

The primary community visited, Woodcrest, is a rural community of roughly three hundred people living life together. During their trip they toured their farm, Rifton Equipment which builds adaptive equipment for people with disabilities (they have donated equipment to L'Arche), Community Playthings which makes high quality playground equipment for children, and Plough, their publishing house which has published articles and books by and about Henri Nouwen and other L'Arche members. John and Sam also visited The Mount Academy, their residential high school program housed in a former Roman Catholic seminary founded in 1907 by the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer, to discuss gap year options for Academy graduates to come to L'Arche. The visit culminated with John giving a brief talk to the Woodcrest community during their Sunday morning service.

John and Sam encountered overwhelming hospitality and good company during their visit, not to mention excellent food and faith sharing. L'Arche is indebted to the Bruderhof and grateful for the relationship we have as both communities seek to build a more inclusive and just world.



DAY OF REFLECTION: GROWING CLOSER TOGETHER
